Hello,

We continue to work on rebuilding our staffing levels after multiple vacancies in the last year and are nearing the end of our second Firefighter Academy of 2023. Our two recruits, Bruin Hinton and Logan Fischer, are going through a challenging eight-week academy learning all of the knowledge, skills, and abilities needed to be a Humboldt Bay Firefighter! We are currently recruiting for Firefighter again as our eligibility list has been exhausted. With this recruitment we expect to hold a third Firefighter Academy in the fall of 2023.

We held Apparatus Operator training for our newer firefighters in May and held a promotion ceremony in June to recognize our newest Engineers and Captain:







2023 DEPARTMENT RESPONSE NUMBERS

STRUCTURE FIRE







Structure Fire 3206 Ingley Street, Eureka.

At 1109am Friday April 21, 2023, Humboldt Bay Fire units including 3 engines, a ladder truck, and one duty chief, were dispatched to a structure fire in a residential structure at the 3206 Ingley Street in Eureka. Bystanders reported smoke coming from a second story bedroom window.

The first arriving unit was quickly on scene and reported a working fire in a two-story residence with light smoke coming from a second story window. Crews quickly deployed a hoseline to the second-floor bedroom and extinguished the fire within 10 minutes.

The Incident Commander had requested a second alarm for a potential attic fire and for station coverage. Damage was limited to the bed in one bedroom, with heavy smoke damage throughout the rest of the second story. One occupant was home at the time and suffered smoke inhalation injuries when he attempted to extinguish the fire.

Medical care was provided by City Ambulance who were staged on scene. The patient was briefly treated and refused transport. The pet dog was not injured in the fire,

HBF reminds residents to keep close attendance of open flames in living spaces, and to call 911 before attempting self-extinguishment. Any delay in calling 911 for an emergency may create significant injuries and damage due to with rapid fire spread

and the house was cleared of any other people or pets. The other residents of the house were not home at the time of the incident.

UNION SPOTLIGHT

Our local 652 Professional Fire Fighters Union is affiliated with the International Association of Fire Fighters and is part of Humboldt Del Norte Central Labor Council. Our goal is to work with our administration, parent agencies, and local partners to promote a safe and healthy work environment that will foster and retain quality employees who can best serve our community.

This month we are very excited to talk about the addition of 3 new Rescue Swimmers to our Water Rescue Program. The Water Rescue Program is not only a critical need for our community but it is an example of the Union and the Administration working together to build a better all-risk emergency service Fire Department.

We want to take the time to thank the HBF JPA Board and Fire Chief Robertson for all of their continued support and efforts in maintaining this program. Cooperating with local 652, they have been able to allocate funding to pay for protective equipment, classes, incentive pay, and ongoing training.



On June 1st – 3rd, Firefighters Rebecca Ciszewski, Griffin Barnes and Anthony Zamudio participated in the Open Water Rescue Class put on through the Humboldt County Fire Instructors Association and taught by our very own Fire Captain Dave Terry. All three Firefighters did great in the class, had fun and learned a lot of water rescue techniques that are specific to our local bay. Upon the completion of the course, the Water Rescue Team is back to full strength with 12 full members.

Each member is outfitted with the following gear: wet suit & dry suit, booties, gloves, hood, high visibility rash guard, PFD with quick release device fins, snorkel and a mask.

Each apparatus is equipped with the standard water rescue bag for shore based crews. This bag consists of life jackets for crew safety and rope bags which can be used to throw to a victim in the water and drag them safely to shore. Water rescue cans are also placed on each apparatus and these can be used by water rescue swimmers to float up to two people. Additionally, all apparatus have water rescue boards with handles capable of floating 6 individuals. It is the swimmers discretion which piece of equipment they choose to use based on the conditions given



Every swimmer has taken the SFT Open Water Rescuer- Basic course. The class is a 24 hour, 3 day class which covers shore based training, in-water rescue techniques, boat and helicopter operations, submerged victim searches and surf rescue components. Most individuals have also been trained in Swift Water Rescue as well. The three newest member each have 1 year to complete the Swift Water Rescue class. The team conducts 4 quarterly trainings each year and members are required to attend at least 50 % of these drills to stay on the team. Additionally, each member must pass a swim test that is 500 yards in under 12 minutes. We're proud to say most of our members are able to make the swim in under 10 minutes! All 12 fulltime team members receive 3% incentive pay. They are expected to swim and train off duty to maintain a higher level of physical fitness in order to meet the rigorous demands that a water rescue response would place on them. The team also conducts joint training with outside agencies such as the US Coast Guard, Southern Humboldt Tech Rescue and Eel River Tech Rescue.

We are available to respond throughout most of the bay, Elk River, Freshwater and all adjoining sloughs. We are available for mutual aid on a case by case basis. Swimmers are now able to respond and effect rescues off of any of the Harbor Districts boats. We were recently able to acquire a zodiac boat through grant funding and have been working on starting up a Boat Operator Program in addition to the Water Rescue Team. Once the personnel have been trained and the Boat Operator Program is up and running, it will expand our rescue capabilities throughout the bay.


We once again just want to thank everyone who has worked to maintain this excellent program that provides better community service to the greater Humboldt Bay area.

DEPARTMENT TRAINING RECRUIT ACADEMY 2023

Humboldt Bay Fire completed a recruit academy for two new hires. The academy consisted of 9 weeks of training on various skills such as HazMat, ladders, rope rescue, hose, forcible entry, live fire, and more.

WILDFIRE PREPAREDNESS TIPS

We recognized Wildfire Preparedness Week May 1-7 and would like to share these wildfire prevention and defensible space tips.

Fire season is upon us. Help keep Humboldt safe and out of the headlines. Prepare for a wildfire now by maintaining your lawn and removing combustible debris from around your home. Take care when using lawn mowers that may create sparks, especially as the temperatures increase and grasses begin to dry.

Creating defensible space is essential to improve your home's chance of surviving a wildfire. It's the buffer you create between a building on your property and the grass, trees, shrubs or any wildland area that surround it. This space is needed to slow or stop the spread of wildfire and it protects your home from catching fire – either from direct flame contact or radiant heat. Defensible space is also important for the protection of the firefighters defending your home. Here are tips to create defensible space.

- Remove all dead plants, grass and weeds (vegetation).
- Remove dead or dry leaves and pine needles from your yard, roof and rain gutters.
- Trim trees regularly to keep branches a minimum of 10 feet from other trees.
- Remove branches that hang over your roof and keep dead branches 10 feet away from your chimney.
- Relocate wood piles at least 30 feet from structures.
- Remove or prune flammable plants and shrubs near windows.
- Remove vegetation and items that could catch fire from around and under decks.
- Create a separation between trees, shrubs and items that could catch fire, such as patio furniture, wood piles, swing sets, etc.

• Remove all tree branches at least 6 feet from the ground. Allow extra vertical space between shrubs and trees. Lack of vertical space can allow a fire to move from the ground to the brush

to the tree tops like a ladder.
