During the wet and cold winter, Humboldt Bay Fire sees an increase in calls to homes for fires caused by heating appliances whether it be a rug pulled over the top of a floor furnace causing the rug to catch fire, a chimney fire, or a stovepipe that hasn't been cleaned or inspected in a while, these incidents have the potential for disastrous consequences. Before firing up that heater, make sure there are adequate clearances from combustibles. Similarly, before building that roaring fire in the woodstove, ensure that regular maintenance has been performed and the chimney cleaned if needed.

Along with the cooler temperatures, we begin seeing deep standing water, ice, and snow on the roadways. If you plan to be traveling through areas with such hazards, make sure that you are aware of your speed, allow extra time to reach your destination, are well prepared for the conditions, and drive defensively!

From our family to yours, we wish you a safe, bountiful, and successful 2024.




STRUCTURE FIRES

At 0849 hours on Wednesday November 1st, 2023, Humboldt Bay Fire responded with 3 Engines, 1 Truck, and 2 Chief Officers to a residential structure fire at the 1200 block of Allard Ave. While responding to the initial call, we received a report of a possible disabled occupant inside of the residence that may need assistance in evacuating.

The 1st arriving Engine made entry into the structure and discovered fire coming out of the back side. The fire was quickly extinguished and it was confirmed that no occupants were inside. The remainder of smoke was ventilated and the entirety of the residence suffered heavy smoke and fire damage. There were no civilian or Firefighter injuries. The fire was located and controlled within a few minutes of the arrival of the 1st Engine. Damages are estimated to be approximately \$25,000. A fire investigation was conducted and the cause of the fire was determined to be accidental in nature.







At 1734 hours on Tuesday November 28th, 2023, Humboldt Bay Fire responded with four Engines, and a Chief Officer to a structure fire at the 1200 block of Ridgewood Dr. While responding to the initial call, we received a report of a possible exposure to the vegetation. The 1st arriving Engine secured a water source and set up for a defensive attack. The vacant trailer was fully involved with no spread to the vegetation. The second arriving engine provided support and assisted with fire attack and all other engines were canceled. There was a report of explosions and it was determined the owner had butane canisters and propane in the trailer. Crews remained on scene for approximately two hours for overhaul operations.

There were no Firefighter injuries. The property owner sustained minor burns to both hands and was evaluated by City Ambulance. The fire was located and controlled within fifteen minutes of the arrival of the 1st Engine.

Damages are estimated to be approximately \$53,000. A fire investigation was conducted and the cause of the fire was determined to be accidental in nature.


HBF'S ANNUAL OPEN HOUSE 2023

RESCUES

The crew on Engine 8112
encountered an adorable kitten
during a call today. Sadly, its owner
had passed away, leaving the kitty in
need of food and care. The crew
brought the kitten back to the
station, ensuring its safety and even
providing a makeshift litter box. The
kitten was taken home by a
firefighter's family and eventually
went to live with a very sweet and
loving permanent family.





On Sunday November 26th 2023 @ 1400 hours Humboldt Bay Fire was dispatched to a Water Rescue in Humboldt Bay near the Wharfinger Building located at 1 Marina Way. Humboldt Bay Fire responded with 1 Chief Officer, 3 Engines and 1 Truck. While responding HBF units were advised a subject was reported in the waters of Humboldt Bay between the Wharfinger Building and Samoa. HBF requested the United States Coast Guard also respond to assist. HBF Truck 8181 arrived at the Wharfinger Building and confirmed a subject was in the water approximately 300 yards off shore drifting south in Humboldt Bay with the outgoing tide. The swimmer from Truck 8181 immediately deployed into the water with a rescue board towards the victim. Other HBF units staged at locations along Humboldt Bay south of the Wharfinger Building including the Schnieder Dock, Del Norte Pier and **Bulk Fuel Plant. The swimmer from T8181 contacted** the victim who was conscious, hypothermic and in distress. A second swimmer from HBF Engine 8115 deployed into the water from the Del Norte Pier and assisted the swimmer from Truck 8181 with bringing the victim back to shore. The victim was suffering from hypothermia and transported to St. Joseph Hospital by City Ambulance.

LIVE FIRE TRAINING

The property owner was generous enough to allow us to conduct a live fire training for our crews and our recruit academy. This type of training is invaluable because opportunities like this do not come up often in a non-emergency scenario. The recruits learn the importance of flow path and how fire behaves without the pressure of potential civilian injuries or exposure to other properties.

Each recruit worked closely with seasoned Firefighters or Company Officers to get important tips and tricks of the trade.

Half of the home decoration fires in December are started by candles.



More than 1/3 of home decoration fires are started by candles.



Christmas is the peak



Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything





More than 1 in every 5 Christmas tree fires were caused by a heat source too close to the tree.



Read manufacturer's light strands to connect.



Make sure your tree is at least 3 feet away from heat sources like fireplaces, radiators, space heaters, candles or heat vents. Also, make sure your tree does not block exits.



Get rid of your tree after Christmas or when it is dry.

Did you know?

Nearly half of holiday decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.

It's fun to decorate for the winter holidays, but holiday decorations can increase your risk for a home fire. As you deck the halls this season, be fire smart.

- o Inspect holiday lights each year before you put them up. Throw away light strands with frayed or pinched wires.
- o Water your Christmas tree every day. A dry tree is dangerous because I can catch on fire easily.
- Consider using battery-operated flameless candles, which can look. smell and feel like real candles.
- o If you do use lit candles, make sure they are in stable holders and place them where they cannot be knocked down easily.

Fire Safety Cluring Winter Storms Winter storms can happen almost anywhere. They can cause us problems. Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month.
 This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an

emergency.

Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.

- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers
 of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an
 emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn
 at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed.

important reminder

There are more home fires in winter than in any other season. Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February.

As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart!

Nearly half of all space heater fires involve electric space heaters.
